

Lydden Vale Gardening Club




The Club's final outing of the summer season, on a beautiful August afternoon, was attended by 33 members and guests who visited "Carey's Secret Garden" near Wareham, well named as you would be unlikely to come across this garden by accident!

The south facing three-and-a-half-acre garden is, unusually, walled on three sides only, with the fourth bounded by iron railings to allow the frost and early morning mists to roll out of the garden to the River Piddle flood plain, leaving the plants growing in the garden unscathed. It was constructed towards the end of the 19th century

to serve the Trigon Estate and was in its heyday in the 1920's before starting a period of long decline and by the late 1970's had ceased to be used as a garden. When purchased by the Constantine Family shortly prior to the Covid Pandemic it was unrecognisable as such being totally overgrown with Laurel, brambles and tall grasses.

Simon Constanine, son of the new owners recognised the potential of the enclosed former garden and embarked upon its restoration, soon discovering that the walls were in a remarkably good condition and that the gardens themselves could be reinstated under the guidance of his design team headed by Paul Scriven and Dan Smith, to provide a balance between a formal traditional walled garden layout and those aspects that we find attractive today with a more informal approach including areas of rewilding, and the use of natural gardening techniques. We were fortunate to enjoy a

guided tour by Dan and see all that has



Carey's Secret Garden is not the "Lost Gardens of Heligan" recreated in Dorset and is much more compact, but its setting is very special, and it is already recognised as a centre of excellence for certain

plants, particularly Salvias. If you have an interest in garden restoration projects Carey's Secret Garden should be on your list.



Our forthcoming winter season had been programmed to start on 10th September but has been brought forward by a week to <u>Wednesday 3rd September</u> due to exceptional circumstances. Steve Fry of Castle Gardens Sherborn will give a talk on the Subject of "Garden Friends and Foes". 



In the Buckland Newton Book Corner.....

A couple of years ago in this magazine, I reviewed and recommended Claire Keegan's Booker Prize shortlisted novel 'Small Things Like These'. I remember that the depth of her writing surprised me, and despite being a quick read, gave me much to think about. So, when I recently came across her latest book 'So Late in the Day' it was an easy decision to purchase it and delve right in.

Set in Dublin, the story takes place on a single day in summer, with occasional chapters dedicated to providing the back story. Central to the story is Cathal, who we first see whiling away the afternoon at the office – clearly bothered by something, although we don't know what at this stage. All will be revealed in time though, with Keegan drip-feeding us additional information at a beautifully calibrated pace. Something about Cathal's situation soon begins to seem strange. Cathal's



boss comes over and urges him to "call it a day"; Cathal absentmindedly neglects to save the budget file he's been working on. He then refrains from checking his messages on the bus ride home, because we're told, he: "found he wasn't ready — then wondered if anyone ever was ready for what was difficult or painful." Cathal eventually returns to his empty house and thinks about his fiancée who's moved out. Cathal is heading into the long weekend with just a bottle of champagne and thoughts of what might have been......

For me there is no doubt Keegan is a good author – she uses her skill at not wasting a single word, each phrase deliberately and carefully chosen to convey these moments that matter, just enough for us to invest in the narrative and fill in the missing detail for ourselves. There is just one incident from Cathal's past that is described, which suggests that there must have been many, many more similar incidents but these are not mentioned. There is as much meaning in what Keegan leaves out in her perfectly paced and measured storytelling as there is in each meticulously placed sentence.

This is a very thin book (just 47 pages in the paperback) and I read it in one sitting, but continued to think about it for days, such is the power of this mini masterpiece. Worth a read!



Mostly Moths - Oak Eggar





Dear Friends,

The excavations by Sheffield University have reminded us of what life was like in the Medieval village. Roles were determined by parentage, class and ethnicity- British or Roman, Norman or Saxon. In Buckland Newton, Glastonbury Abbey and in the Cerne valley its own Abbey directed and controlled many lives, though also provided a structure and support for the whole society.

After the Dissolution of the Monasteries, chaos and poverty must have been a consequence of the extraction of all financial capital to London. The new landowners were exploitative and demanding. This was the dawn of the Modern Age, the beginning of Britain's meandering wander to Empire as the vast wealth of the monasteries was re-invested in London in the new trading Companies exploring the world in search of trade and profit.

The Modern village we recognise from Barnes and Hardy. There was a great gulf between the poor labourers' cottages and the Country House.

To the outside view, encouraged by media, film and television, whether Poldark or Downton Abbey, that all carries on. We are proud of our local aristocracy, of our traditions and quaint customs. We love our traditional Fetes and Horticultural Shows and enjoy attending the annual round of activities.

In reality however, we are now living in Post Modernity. Our villagers are increasingly peopled by highly talented and experienced middle-class urbanites who have been tempted by glossy supplements 'Top ten places to retire' or 'Move to the Country'. We choose our own role in our re-created drama of rural village life.

Just in time, because it is increasingly hard to maintain the traditional activities. Incomers can bring so much and are leading a revival in village life nationally.

But we need local participation. 1000 years after its foundation, Godmanstone church is in desperate need of a Treasurer for its modest accounting requirement. Minterne and Buckland Newton are facing up to challenging church roof repairs.

So, if you love these communities and revel in them, and could lend a hand to the wheel, we would be so very grateful.

Protect Yourself Against Shingles - Are You Eligible for the Free NHS Vaccine?

Shingles is a painful skin rash caused by the reactivation of the chickenpox virus, and it can have long-lasting effects – particularly for older adults and those with certain health conditions. Fortunately, the **NHS shingles vaccination** is available to help protect those most at risk.

Who is eligible?

Under the current NHS programme in England, you may be eligible for the free shingles vaccine if you are:

- Aged 70–79 and haven't yet had the vaccine
- Aged 65 (new eligibility from September 2023)
- Aged 50 or over with a severely weakened immune system

Turning 65 or 70 this year – you will be invited after your birthday

The vaccine helps reduce your risk of getting shingles and can lessen the severity and duration of symptoms if you do get it.



YOUR NIGHT SKY - SEPTEMBER 2025

Did you manage to see any of the Perseid meteor shower last month? I was out for about 2 hours around midnight on the night of the 12^{th,} but I didn't see any. I did see a single bright one a couple of days earlier.

September night skies are about as long as the daylight hours with the autumn equinox on September 22nd. It is a lovely time of the year to observe the sky as it can be very clear and not too cold to be outside. The lovely Milky Way is still prominent crossing the sky from northeast to southwest. We are so lucky in Buckland Newton to have such dark skies that we can see the Milky Way, but we have to be careful that we don't lose them. Don't let your outside lights shine upwards, sideways, or shine outside your private area. There is in fact a legal obligation not to cause a nuisance to your neighbours with your lights shining into their property.

This month's constellation is Aquarius (The Water Carrier). This constellation lies in the southeastern sky below the constellation of Pegasus. It is about halfway up to overhead (the zenith).



AQUARIUS

Aquarius contains a couple of interesting things to see. The first is M2. This is a lovely globular cluster of thousands of stars which are visible as a fuzzy spot of light through a pair of binoculars. Next is the Helix Nebula which can also be seen through a pair of binoculars as a cloud about half the size of the Moon. It is the largest and closest of planetary nebulas to the Earth and is 700 light years away. Planetary nebular are clouds of gas and dust illuminated by the star which they surround. They can by either the material from which planets are forming or the debris thrown off by the star when it is coming to the end of its life. The star at the centre of the Helix nebula has used all of its fuel and is dying.

THE PLANETS THIS MONTH. Saturn is the planet of the month. It reaches opposition, when it is closest to the Earth, on September 21st. The best time to see it is at 01:00 BST in the south. Mercury will be visible on September 1st about 30 minutes before sunrise, low in the east-northeast. It will be close to the Beehive Cluster of stars (M44) on September 1st. Venus will rise about 3 hours before Sunrise, which is at around 03:20 BST. On the 19th, Venus will be occulted (covered) by the Moon starting at 12:48 BST and finishing at 13:14:07BST. Jupiter is best seen at the end of the month in the southeast at around 5:00 BST, although it is visible throughout the month as an early morning planet.


THE MOON. Full Moon is on September 7th with New Moon on September 21st. On September 7th there will be a total eclipse of the Moon just as the Moon rises in the East at Sunset. Mars is not visible this month. Jupiter



Over time a group of the endowed schools became known as "public schools" to differentiate from private teaching by tutors and to indicate that they were open to the public regardless of religious beliefs, locality and social status.
